## DIFFERENCES BETWEEN DOMESTIC ABUSE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND SEXUAL ASSAULT

If you or someone you know has experienced domestic abuse or sexual assault, resources are available to support you or a loved one in need.

DOMESTIC ABUSE	Domestic abuse is a pattern of behavior resulting in physical, emotional, or psychological abuse, economic control, or interference with personal liberty that is directed toward an intimate partner. Domestic abuse can be physical, emotional, sexual, or neglect.
DOMESTIC VIOLENCE	Domestic violence is an offense involving the use, attempted use, or threatened use of force or violence against a person or a violation of a lawful order issued for the protection of a person who is an intimate partner.
SEXUAL ASSAULT	Sexual assault is defined as intentional sexual contact, characterized by the use of force, threats, intimidation, or abuse of authority or when the victim does not or cannot consent.

## WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE?

Although the definitions can overlap, there are some key distinctions. Domestic violence is the criminal act of domestic abuse. Domestic abuse is the actual behavior. Victims of domestic abuse can experience sexual assault or sexual abuse within their relationship. However, a sexual assault can occur outside of an intimate relationship.

FAP provides non-medical counseling, safety planning, and other supportive services. Everyone deserves to be in a relationship that is free of abuse.
